“Rodenator” Rabbit warren destruction demonstration at Bruarong – Saturday 7th May, at 10.30am at the top of Tunnel Gap Road, Bruarong (look for Landcare signs). The rabbit is a serious environmental and agricultural pest and can impact on farm productivity and native ecosystems, leading to financial loss and environmental destruction. Whilst the release of the virus booster in 2016/2017 will reduce rabbit numbers, the virus needs to be combined with destruction of warrens. Pest Smart states that: “*Warren destruction is the most important part of lasting rabbit control.*” Warren ripping is one method, the use of the rodenator is another. Kiewa Catchment scoops major Fire Awards for Indigenous Fire Knowledge Project

Kiewa Catchment was delighted to walk away with two Awards from the Fire Awareness Awards held in Melbourne. The Awards were for “Community-Led Prevention and Preparedness” and the big one for the night, the “RACV Insurance Award for Excellence”, which came with a cheque for \$5000.00. The money will be used to further develop their work in this area. They would like to thank all the project partners that have been vital to the success of this project: trial site holders, Bridget Doyle, Rhonda Sinclair and Greg Hayes. North East CMA staffers, Richard McTernan, Brendon Kennedy and Simon Feillafe. Uncle Rod Mason, Indigenous Senior Fire Knowledge holder, the CFA, Project ecologist Paul Foreman, The Australian Government for providing funding and the many people who contributed to the Fire forums and Native Grasses Field Day. The win has resulted in considerable media coverage, with stories in the Border Mail, The Weekly Times, ABC radio and Melbourne Community radio. Well done to all involved!



Blue-green algae

As of early March, red alert warnings for blue-green algae remain in place for large parts of the Murray River system and its tributaries. There have also been reports of blue green algae identified in farm dams across the area. The red alert level warning indicates these waters are unsuitable for recreational use or primary contact by domestic users and may also pose a threat to livestock and pets. The species of blue-green algae identified are potentially toxic and may cause gastroenteritis in humans if consumed and skin and eye irritations after contact. Boiling the water does not remove algal toxins. People are advised not to enter the water, not to drink untreated water or bathe in water drawn from the river while this red alert level warning is in place. Appropriate water treatment is in place by the local water utilities and town water supplies remain unaffected and safe to drink. Blue-green algae usually appear as green paint-like scums on the water, near the edges, or as greenish clumps throughout the water. It makes the water appear dirty, green or discoloured and generally has a strong musty or earthy odour. People should not eat mussels or crayfish from red level warning areas. Any fish caught should be cleaned and washed thoroughly in uncontaminated water and any internal organs disposed of before consumption. Blue-green algae occur naturally and can reproduce quickly in favourable conditions where there is still or slow-flowing water, abundant sunlight and sufficient levels of nutrients. Regional Riparian Action Plan launched: Minister for Environment, Climate Change and Water, Lisa Neville, has launched the Regional Riparian Action Plan, a new five-year plan to improve the health of Victoria's rivers, wetlands and estuaries. This plan outlines priority riparian management outcomes to be achieved across regional Victoria from 2015-16 to 2019-20. The plan aims to accelerate on-ground riparian work, such as stock management fencing, revegetation, weed management and the provision of off-stream stock watering infrastructure. It also has new initiatives to improve the management of riparian land. The action plan was developed in consultation with key stakeholders including catchment management authorities, Traditional Owners, Victorian Landcare Council, Environment Victoria, Victorian National Parks Association, and the Victorian Farmers Federation. Funding Opportunities



Round 2 - Community Volunteer Action Grants and Crowdfunding opportunities: \$2 million dollars will be provided to small-scale, local threatened species projects that build community connections to the local environment. This program recognises the value of grassroots community action in making change happen quickly. For more information: [click here](#)



Critical Action and Strategic Partnerships Grants: \$3 million dollars has been provided to environmental agencies and organisations, as experts in threatened species management, to undertake work that reduces threats and secures important sites for threatened species.



Crowdfunding: The Victorian Government has also committed \$200,000 to a crowdfunding pilot to support threatened species conservation campaigns. Crowdfunding enables the community to directly invest in causes and projects that they value, and are particularly passionate about. The crowdfunding pilot is offering community groups and not-for-profit organisations a unique opportunity to raise funds for additional threatened species actions, whilst having their fundraising efforts matched by government.
